



John 10:10 *The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I (Jesus) have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.*

This verse is part of the Gospel text for May 30. What does it mean to have the full life that Jesus came to give? What is it that steals that life away? There are many things that diminish our sense of self and dull our understanding of ourselves as beloved children of God. Many voices in our time and culture tell us that we are not enough as we are; or they encourage us to believe that we are the center of the universe. What is required to have the life that Jesus came to give? Simply to be the beloved child of God that we are; to live out of and through the love God has for us shown most clearly and definitively through Jesus the Christ. If we listen to the many voices, it is easy to despair, to lose hope, to let go of all that is good and true and beautiful in our lives and see only what is wrong. It is easy to sink into the hole filled with what 'we had hoped' or to stay mired in the past which is the muckiest mud to be found. When the many voices make it difficult to hear the one voice who calls you beloved, call a friend, grab a lifeline, ask for help, pray. Listen to the one voice that is always there saying, "I love you" even when you are being stubborn, slow of heart, sinful, destructive, downright foolish. When the many voices are clamoring for your attention; stop and be sure you are thinking clearly so that you make good decisions. Sin curves us inward so that we only see ourselves and only what we want or think or feel seems important. Love says different. Whenever there is a choice, choose life, love, hope, joy, kindness. If ever you are about to do something, and there is even a whisper that perhaps you shouldn't; stop and listen. Like when you've indulged in alcohol or other drugs and you wonder for a moment if you should drive. Or when you are at your lowest and think that death is the right choice. Stop. Wait. Listen. Ask for help, own your own stuff and be responsible. Life can be hard and unfair and unreasonable; and life is amazing, joyful, an incredible gift. Living to the fullest, knowing who and whose we are is worth every moment we are given. Listen until you hear the one voice that matters - the one who spoke creation into

existence, the Word who become flesh, the voice that says, "I have come that you might have life and have it fully." Listen carefully. Play safe, be well, live without fear, love wisely and whole heartedly. Do the right thing and trust that you are never alone because God who loves you is with you.

American Lutheran work began in 1922 when the Augustana Synod sent Ralph Hult to the former Tanganyika. During the following decades, many more Augustana missionaries arrived and served in central Tanganyika, in the area in and around Singida. Born in 1888, Pastor Hult grew up at Bethany Lutheran Church of Axtell, Nebraska.

The Northern Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT-ND) is among the fastest growing Christian churches in the world. With over 400,000 members, the ELCT-ND is led by Bishop Dr. Fredrick Shoo and many fine diocese officers. The ELCT-ND reaches out to people in the Kilimanjaro region with education, health-care, programs for the physically disabled, and most importantly the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The Northern Diocese and the Nebraska Synod share a relationship through the ELCA Companion Synod Program

(www.elca.org/companionsynod), which continues to grow deeper. We continually work together to enable dozens of projects. A number of congregations in the Nebraska Synod enjoy a churchto-church relationship with a congregation in the Northern Diocese. In partnership with CHI (formerly Alegent) Health and Immanuel Communities, significant work continues in healthcare. Vision trips to Tanzania are hosted annually. Many Tanzanian visitors, including diocesan leaders, members of parishes, teachers, pastors and others, are welcomed to Nebraska routinely. These relationships are lived out in the lives of individuals, congregations, agencies and institutions of Christ's Church. Through these relationships, we have nurtured and strengthened one another for life and mission within the Body of Christ.

2024 Vision Trip to Tanzania

The partnership between the ELCT Northern Diocese and the Nebraska Synod, ELCA is over 28 years old. For many years, Synod sponsored Vision Trips have provided an opportunity to get an insider's view of one of the most amazing countries on the planet. We live in the shadow of Mount Kilimanjaro, witness the many important ministries of the Northern Diocese, make Tanzanian friends, and experience a fabulous safari to the Ngorongoro Crater and Serengeti National Park.

YOU can experience the amazing country of Tanzania and meet our many friends in the ELCT Northern Diocese (and the animals in Ngorongoro Crater and Serengeti region). The 2024 Tanzania Vision Trip is planned for Jan. 21 – Feb. 6, 2024. The cost is expected to be about \$2,900 plus actual airfare (currently about \$1,600). Space is limited. 

Our next meeting will be Monday, May 8. Sandy Boots will serve as host and lesson leader.


