

As promised, some resources about Israel and Palestine. These were compiled in the New England Synod which is a companion synod to The Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land; so many are from the perspective of Palestinian Christians. Part of our work of loving neighbor is, I believe, the work of seeking to hear their story. I hope that some of these might help to begin to have an understanding the modern conflict in the Holy Land. When we read through the Old Testament, we can see a bit of how the old, old story has laid a foundation for today's complicated situation. However, the Old Testament is more than a 'history' of a region or of a people; it is in fact, telling the human story. It is our story, not their story. It tells the story of God's relationship, some call it love affair, with humankind and the universe. It tells of humankind who seem to desire to be God more than they are willing to accept the finiteness of being created from the dust of the earth. It tells of God's faithfulness to his covenant with the forefather of Jews, Muslims and Christians. We are all connected and on a very basic level we mostly all want the same things and have the same needs. Security, food, shelter, education, family and friends; the freedom to practice our faith and to celebrate our culture. May God's love be lived out loud in the world, so that, all might know that we are all God's beloved.

Adult Christian Education -- it was so great to do the 90 Days Through the Bible this past summer that I've been thinking of how we might construct a slightly deeper dive into the whole Bible. Yes, the whole Bible. Here's what I'm thinking: are you ready? Starting in mid-February we would meet for an hour or so, 2X a month for the next year or two. We would begin with Genesis and work our way through the Bible. I'm imaging there would be a 15 minute or so overview of the book or section, then we'd read and discuss key passages/people and time for questions. There would be a schedule of readings & topics; so, if you couldn't be at all the classes, you could 'drop-in' for a month or two or just for a particular book. Some classes we'd look at several books; other times we might spend a whole class (or two) on one book. Anybody interested? Let Pastor know by the end of November if you are interested; as some planning needs to be done in order to start in February.

At both council meetings it was agreed that moving the usual month for annual meeting – to accommodate pastor's travel plans – made sense. Both constitutions stipulate a particular month; so each congregation will be holding a special congregational meeting to vote on amending the constitution for a one time change of the month of the annual meeting. Trinity will hold that special congregational meeting on November 11 immediately after service. The proposed date for the 2023 annual meeting is Saturday, December 2, after the Greening of the Church service.

Grace has a bit more time, so the special meeting has not been scheduled yet; however, the proposed date for the 2024 annual meeting is February 11 after the worship service.

The joint council meeting last night was a time of fruitful conversation and thoughtful discerning. The proceeds of the Harvest Auction and the Octoberfest suppers were discussed. Here's the plan - Harvest Auction money to be split between: Compassion International for the child Trinity sponsors and expenses for animals for the Living Nativity on December 5. Oktoberfest proceeds were designated for local needs and here is the split approved for that (and all but one were suggested by Trinity members) - \$8000 divided among Veteran's Memorial Park; West Point Food Pantry; Protein and Dairy for the monthly food distribution; the Good Samaritan funds at Trinity & Grace. The remaining amount \$130 for Living Nativity expenses.

There will be some wonderful and fun opportunities to get to know each other in January! Be ready to sign up to share a meal, hosted by members of Grace and Trinity. Keep an eye out and ear open after Christmas to be part of the first wave of fun!
